

In the Beginning... Planning & Organization Committee met weekly, resulting in rapid production of Bylaws, Charter, Mission, Goals and incorporation as tax-exempt educational non-profit 501(c)3; Board of Directors (all volunteer) was established with broad spectrum of educational, professional and environmental experience; Board members engaged in intensive self-education through attendance at numerous civic, state, watershed & environmental workshops.

- Aerial & ground photography of Watershed area for documentation of baseline conditions and future reference;
- Authorship of numerous position papers documenting both historical background & existing conditions in northeast San Fernando valley;
- Community Participation ranging from assisting Project GRAD's workshops and Hansen Dam Clean-Up Day, to Día del Caballo.
- <u>Databases</u> created for tracking stats, photos, video, publications and other information pertinent to open space, wildlife habitat, water quality & environmental justice issues;
- Documentary ~ Produced video documenting vital role played by Hansen Dam lakes in fighting fires in the Northeast Valley in fall 2003;
- <u>Education / Press</u> ~ Authoring or facilitating publication of articles in newspapers; creation of brochures, press packets & educational materials;
- **Environmental Reference Library** ~ established & augmented daily (local & national);
- Grassroots Activism ~ Spearheaded Hansen Dam Lakes campaign; was invited to present evidence and testify before Water Quality Control Board regarding Army Corps of Engineers' illegal dumping (see TujungaWatershed.org's Hot Topics page);
- ➤ Health & Safety Reporting ~ When local officials did not take action, TWC contacted senior officials downtown, resulting in removal of numerous safety hazards from HD;
- > **Networking** ~ Sharing best practices with local and national groups;
- Outreach ~ Via presentations to various neighborhood councils, city and civic organizations, consultations with developers, and via providing tours of the watershed for elected officials and agency representatives;
- <u>Recognition (National)</u> ~ Certificate of Appreciation from Sea World/Busch Gardens /Fuji Film's 2003 Environmental Excellence Awards;
- Safety /Incident Tracking ~ created web links and Incident Report form with Grid of Hansen Dam basin, for purpose of documenting and tracking incidents or hazards;
- **Youth Essay Contest** Created first annual Contest & awarded 2003 winner;
- Website created, and accompanying donor/volunteer database & distribution list.

(Pictured behind Dennis is an issue requiring action in 2004 – the above 100-year-old trees and meadowland are the last such habitat remaining in Hansen Dam. This area with its combination of mature trees and surrounding low vegetation is used daily by raptors like hawks and owls. The trees and meadow are slated for destruction in 2004, as the Hansen Dam Sports Complex expands to a total of 13 new playing fields, parking lots and & concession stands.)

Editorial on the Future of Hansen Dam Why citizens cannot afford to NOT get involved

In 1999 the LA Dept of Recreation and Parks (as required by Prop K) conducted a series of well-advertised workshops throughout the NE Valley. The overwhelming majority of 700 citizens who participated (from Arleta, Pacoima, Sylmar, Lake View Terrace, Sunland-Tujunga, and Sun Valley) expressed the following desire regarding development at Hansen Dam: "**Do nothing.** *Leave It Alone*."

Unfortunately, the "Powers That Be" (or, "Campaign Contributors to The Powers That Be"?) continue to seek development of the last significant habitat area that remains within the City of Los Angeles. Is that discouraging? Of course. When an agency seems to be just going through the motions, with no intention of allowing public input to change a pre-ordained course of action, that's not democracy – it's just a waste of everyone's time. But we prefer to look on the bright side: those workshops provided a valuable lesson. Having identified what doesn't work, we just need to switch tactics to something that DOES work.

If an agency isn't listening to its citizen stakeholders, then the discussion needs to be taken higher up, in a manner that produces positive results.

The population surrounding Hansen Dam is widely diverse culturally, ethnically, and economically, but we have this in common: **We** are the ones who really care about this area's best interests. To fulfill our duty and responsibility as citizens, we need to **get involved**. Now. Before it's too late.

There's an old saying: "All that is necessary for evil to flourish is that good people do nothing."

Where tens of thousands of current users see beauty and nature at Hansen Dam, other people see a vast vacant lot, without value except for its potential to yield construction contracts. Where many seek peace, spiritual renewal and a haven from the chaos and stress of city life, a few seek sweetheart deals and "pay-to-play" business opportunities. Even the basin's original purpose – flood control – has been compromised by tunnel vision and foolishness.

"It's for the kids." The Tujunga Watershed Council & Stakeholders is very concerned about the quality of life for all of Los Angeles' children – and for those children's children, and for those children's great-grandchildren. The stats are inarguable – Los Angeles doesn't have enough open space, and the children (and adults) are suffering.

However, the following is equally inarguable – developing Hansen Dam does nothing to improve the stats. The only way to rectify the shortage is by designating *new* land for parks, thereby increasing the overall percentage of open space, especially in the city's most desperately open-space-poor neighborhoods. "The kids" need parks and playing fields within *walking distance*.

Hansen Dam (raw & "un-improved") is one of the most POSITIVE features this city has. What other major metropolis has wildlife habitat of this size, scope and diversity within city limits, easily accessible to schoolchildren, yet providing fascinating views of Nature at its most primitive? Destruction of this rare wild jewel serves the best interests of no one, except those who profit financially from development.

The save-the-lakes campaign proved that citizens *can* make a difference – when they utilize their time and energy in positive, well-focused, well-informed directions that produce results.

So please, help us save ALL of Hansen Dam, not just the lakes!
